Direction: Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions from 18-20:

Sportsmanship can be conceptualized as an enduring and relatively stable characteristic or disposition such that individuals differ in the way they are generally expected to behave in sports situations. In general, sportsmanship refers to virtues such as fairness, self control, courage and persistence and has been associated with interpersonal concepts of treating others and being treated fairly,



maintaining self control in dealing with others and respect for both authority and opponents. Sportsmanship is also looked at as being the way one reacts to a game or sport or player.

The four elements of sportsmanship are often shown as being in good form, the will to win, equity and fairness. All the four elements are critical and a balance must be found among all four for true sportsmanship to be illustrated. These elements may also cause conflict, as a person may desire to win more than play in equity and fairness, thus resulting in a clash within the aspects of sportsmanship. This will cause problems as the person believes he is being a good sportsman but he is defeating the purpose of this idea as he is ignoring the two key components of being sportsman like, when the athletes become too self centered, the idea of sportsmanship is dismissed.

Today's sporting culture in particular, the base of elite sport, places great importance on the idea of competition and winning and thus sportsmanship has taken a back seat. As a result, in most, if not all sports, sportsmen at the elite level, make the standards on sportsmanship and no matter

whether they like it or not, they are seen as leaders and role models in the society.

Since every sport is rule driven, the most common offence of bad sportsmanship is the act of cheating or breaking rules to gain an unfair advantage. A competitor who exhibits poor sportsmanship after losing a game or contest is often called a 'sore loser', while a competitor, who exhibits poor sportsmanship even after winning is typically called a 'bad winner'. Sore loser behaviour includes blaming others for the loss, not accepting responsibility for personal actions that contributed to the defeat, reacting to the loss in an immature or improper fashion, making excuses for the defeat and citing unfavourable conditions or other petty issues as reasons for the defeat.

A bad winner acts in a shallow fashion after his or her victory such as by gloating about his or her win, rubbing the win in the face(s) of the opponent(s) and lowering the opponent(s)'s self esteem by constantly reminding the opponent(s) of his/her poor performance in comparison (even if the opponent(s) competed well). Not showing respect to the other team is considered to being a bad sportsman and could lead to demoralizing effects.
